CENTER FOR GLOBAL AFFAIRS CELEBRATES TWO MILESTONES:

30th Anniversary of Divisional Dean Vera Jelinek Joining NYU-SCPS and 10th Anniversary of the Establishment of the M.S. in Global Affairs



The Center for Global Affairs (CGA) has two important milestones to celebrate in 2014, which marks the 30th anniversary of Divisional Dean Vera Jelinek joining NYU-SCPS. It was in 1984 that she established a fledgling program in international affairs, which began on a modest scale, and has since grown to become a top-tier academic center that addresses the most critical of global issues and that attracts some of the world's most accomplished faculty members, brightest students, and renowned guest lecturers.

Ranked by the Foreign Policy Association as one of the nation's leading institutions preparing students for international careers, CGA also is commemorating the 10th anniversary of the launch of its flagship program, the M.S. in Global Affairs. "The term global affairs is a very popular catchphrase today," said Jelinek, "but I think our program is unusual in that it stresses the practical application of the discipline, rather than focusing strictly on theory as many degree programs do."

"Being a part of NYU-SCPS," Jelinek added, "has provided CGA with the flexibility to hire professionals in their field who bring their expertise to the classroom, while also attracting students with well-established global careers, not only those who are just completing their undergraduate degrees."

Deeply committed to fostering a sense of global citizenship, Jelinek's worldview was profoundly shaped by her childhood in Slovakia. During WWII, her mother died in the Sobibór extermination camp. Jelinek and her father survived, and came to the U.S. "Because of what I witnessed as a child, an international perspective is innately ingrained in my very being," she stated.

A polyglot who is conversant in Italian, French, and Hungarian, and who has working knowledge of German and Spanish, Jelinek earned a bachelor's degree in history at Queens College, City University of New York; a master's degree in international affairs at Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies; and a Ph.D. in European history at NYU.

Under her leadership, the program in global affairs has evolved—from its formative years when it was simply referred to as international programs; to the Lillian Vernon Center for International Affairs, which had headquarters on 10th Street; to the current Center for Global Affairs, which is based in the Woolworth Building in lower Manhattan. In 1989, when the breakdown of the Communist Bloc generated immense interest in international issues, she launched the noncredit Certificate in Global Affairs. In 2004, she launched the M.S. in Global Affairs with just 69 enrollees. Today, the program boasts 315 graduate students.

CGA also has developed and offers immersive field intensives, providing students with the opportunity to travel overseas with faculty members and engage in research—exploring private-sector initiatives in China, development in Ghana, trafficking in India, and security in Prague, among other issues. A robust public events program also creates a forum for students to meet and to exchange ideas with diplomats, journalists, authors, and expert practitioners who shape and implement policy.

Recently, CGA introduced new graduate certificates in Global Energy, Peacebuilding, and Transnational Security, to acquaint students with contemporary global challenges and to provide professionals with the tools to advance their careers in sectors where they need additional knowledge and further grounding.

Upcoming plans for expansion include a gender studies concentration, executive education training for diplomats, and programs for high school seniors to provide them with exposure to global affairs.

"The CGA family has grown extensively over the last 30 years," said Jelinek. "We have nearly 900 alumni working at the U.N., in the private sector, in the U.S. government, and in countries around the world. I think it is fantastic that we have been able to establish ourselves as a global entity on a global scale."

A kickoff event celebrating the 10th anniversary of the master's program will take place on October 9, 2014, at the NYU Kimmel Center for University Life.

She developed an online course for the ALI on pronunciation and an "English Through Improvisation" enrichment course. Ritter regularly participates in extracurricular activities and has performed with her students at end-term celebrations.

Mona Stiles

In her teaching at the American Language Institute (ALI), Mona Stiles applies her background in theater and her expertise in TESOL to encourage effective communication in her classroom. Stiles effortlessly helps new and international students to transition from the first stages of language acquisition to confident communication and acculturation. Among several credit and graduate courses, Boland co-teaches “Sports Law,” which allows NYU-SCPS and Law School students to cross register. He has pioneered Tisch Center global opportunities in Prague, London, Berlin, and Barcelona, and has helped to bring thought leaders to the Tisch Center, its classrooms, and its students.

Henry Brumleve

Henry “Ted” Brumleve teaches within the Preston Robert Tisch Center for Hospitality, Tourism, and Sports Management, and previously served on the Center’s Advisory Board as well as its Friends Group.
